Anna and Frederik's Two-Day Guide to Copenhagen

Day 1 – See Copenhagen City

Breakfast

Start your day with some delicious oat porridge at café **GRØD** (*“Porridge”*). Located at several places around Copenhagen, GRØD is famous for only serving porridge in different varieties (Dahl, Congee, Risotto etc.) We recommend their traditional oat porridge with caramel sauce, apples and roasted almonds for breakfast. Located in Torvehallerne (Frederiksborggade 21) – right by Nørreport Station.

Kongens have and Rosenborg Castle

After breakfast, we recommend a walk to the beautiful Kongens Have (The Kings Garden) located just 600 meters (0.3 miles) from Torvehallerne. In Kongens Have you will find Rosenborg Castle, which is home to the Danish Crown Jewels. Rosenborg Castle opens at 10.00 am.

Lunch at Selma

Enjoy a lovely lunch with traditional Danish smørrebrød with a modern twist. This restaurant is an absolute must! Try their homemade schnapps with your fish smørrebrød for an extra kick.

Amalienborg Castle and Marmor Church

After lunch we recommend a walk down to the Marmor Church and Amalienborg Slotsplads. The walk is approximately 1.5 km (0.9 miles). Amalienborg Castle is the home of the Queen as well as the Crown Prince and the rest of their family. Outside the castle you will see the Royal Army protecting the castle. From Amalienborg Castle you can see the Danish Opera.

Medicinsk Museion and Frihedsmuseet

If you are interested in museums, Medicinsk Museion and Frihedsmuseet are located just around the corner from Amalienborg Castle. Medicinsk Museion holds the medical history of Denmark. Frihedsmuseet is a newly re-opened history museum with underground exhibitions on the Danish WWII resistance movement.

Day 2 – Discover Locals Secrets

Breakfast

Andersen & Maillard. Enjoy some delicious Danish pastries at this very popular bakery. If you are into something sweet in the mornings their cube croissants are recommended.

Jægersborggade and Ravnsborggade

At these two streets you will find lots of local and trendy shops. There is a very cool and cozy vibe just strolling around.

Assistens Kirkegården

In the middle of Nørrebro you will find Assistens Cemetery. This is the burial site of many Danish

notables such as Hans Christian Andersen, Niels Bohr and Søren Kirkegaard.
